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The Delaware Cannabis Voter Guide

We delivered a five question survey on cannabis policy to Delaware General Assembly candidates on July 20, 2018. The Delaware Cannabis Voter Guide is comprised of candidate responses, along with the cannabis bill voting history of incumbents. The key below includes the survey questions, available responses, and a key for interpreting the survey summary. We've graded candidates (A+ to F) based on incumbent voting history on cannabis bills, sponsorship and opposition of prior cannabis bills, survey responses, and public comments by the candidate.

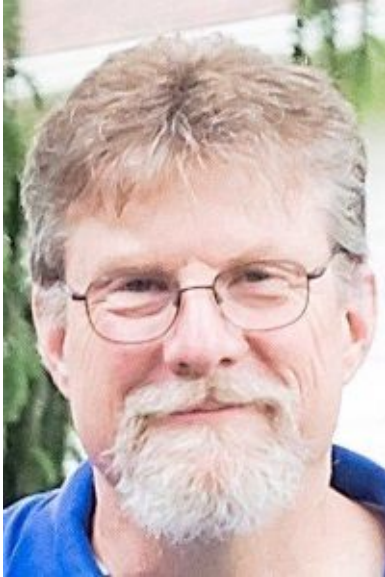
